ANOTHER GREAT YEAR

The Baird Creek Preservation Foundation (BCPF) wishes you a very joyful summer season filled with nature and sunshine!

Our annual report is very late this year but for numerous good reasons. With the unforeseen year that 2020 was, we spent last year getting what projects we could done, and then worked on prepping for 2021. So this year we have been very busy with some amazing projects, working on meeting some massive fundraising goals (for new projects such as the Living Prairie in honor of Paul Hartman and a Biking Skills Park), and working on running our normal projects and programs.

As always we can not thank our donors and volunteers enough for their time, helping hands, and financial support. In 2020, we finished clearing 15 acres of buckthorn on the backside of Triangle Hill, with major help from volunteers, who spent hours dragging it to areas the city could reach for removal. We burned 17 acres of prairie, planted 600+ trees, closed on the purchase of 27+ acres along Huron Rd, and more.

The 27+ acres purchased are both field and forest, and was a missing corridor connection for the Greenway on the south side of the railroad tracks. The foundation will be working on this area over the next few years to restore the south parcel to quality oldgrowth forest and the north section to native prairie. This will provide protection to Baird Creek itself, additional greenspace in the Greenway, and improved habitat for wildlife, pollinators, and the public for recreation.

We continue each year to do an exceptional job of meeting our mission with our programs and projects. View the next page for a list of 2020 projects and programs accomplishments, as well as, 2021's projects, goals, and dreams.

PROJECTS & PROGRAMS IN 2020

- Purchased 27+ acres along Huron Rd to do restoration work and add it to the Baird Creek Greenway
- Summer Camps limited numbers
- Homeschool Classes and Scout groups
- Hired a contractor to remove and treat 15 acres of buckthorn on the backside of Triangle Hill and along the paved trail to the parking lot (then prepped it for removal)
- Burned a 17-acre prairie on the foundation's public land in Eaton Township
- Hired two summer interns for invasive removal
- Began installation of all new trail signage
- Planted 600+ trees
- Held a virtual 5K event
- Created an interactive online story about BCPF and map of the sensitive areas in the Greenway for the public...you can view it here https://bairdcreek.org/history

- Continue restoration projects in the Baird Creek Greenway and Watershed



January 1 - December 31, 2020


REVENUE PERCENTAGE BY AREA OF SUPPORT

BUCKTHORN CUTTING

Supplies Needed: Loppers, Kill Sticks, Herbicide, Gloves, Eye Protection

Instructions

Step 1: Fill kill sticks with herbicide mixture (will be done by BCPF staff)

Step 2: Cut with loppers

Step 3: Treat with kill stick (green/white stick in picture 2 below)

Step 4: Carry trunk and branches to haul away area

Tips: if you get herbicide on your clothing wash separately from other clothing. Do not touch your eyes after touching herbicide or bare skin. The kill sticks do an excellent job of protecting you from the herbicide so use them appropriately.



GARLIC MUSTARD REMOVAL

Supplies Needed: Gloves, Eye Protection

Instructions

Step 1: Grasp the plant near the base and gently pull up; try to get as much of the root as possible

Step 2: Place in a garbage bag and dispose of

Step 3: Carry to haul away area

Tips: Ticks are active now and may be found in leaf litter. If you're pulling in leaf litter, keep an eye out for ticks.





Supplies Needed: Gloves, Eye Protection, Tree Tubes, Stakes, Zipties

Instructions

Step 1: Determine the depth of the planting hole

Step 2: Dig a saucer-shaped planting hole three times the root ball diameter & set the tree in

Step 3: Position the stake 1-1 1/2 inches from the seedling. Then drive stake straight into the soil (about 14-16 inches), just deep enough to keep the top of the stake about 1-2 inches above the top cable tie of the tree tube

Step 4: Install the tube over the seedling first before looping cable ties around stake.

Step 5: Next, insert the cable ties through the access holes wrap the cable ties around the stake, secure and cinch tight



TREE MAINTENANCE

Supplies Needed: Gloves, Eye Protection, Tree Tubes, Stakes, Zipties

Instructions

Step 1: Check to make sure tubes and stakes are straight to allow upward growth of tree

Step 2: Ensure stakes are pushed far enough into ground to remain stable

Step 3: Check that zip ties are secure to tube and stake

Step 4 (optional): Hug tree to ensure growth



NATIVE SEED PLANTING

Supplies Needed: Gloves, Eye Protection, Tarps, Sawdust, Buckets, Rakes

Instructions

Step 1: Spread tarps onto open space

Step 2: Mix seed and sawdust together

Step 3: Put the mixture into 2 buckets

Step 4: Spread the first bucket over 3/4 of the area, use the second bucket to cover the last 1/4 and any area that is "light" on seeding mixture.

Tip: Most people go through the first bucket quick and do not make it through the whole plotted area, that is why we do two buckets. There should be no "leftovers".

Keep behavior respectful to each other and to the neighbors.


Remember, you are representing the Baird Creek Preservation Foundation and AmeriCorps while out in public.

MAP FROM HOUSE TO WORK




Ashwaubenon, WI 54304

- Go west from the house and turn right on Marlee Ave
- Turn left onto Lombardi Ave and get in the far right lane
- Get on I-41going north
- Take I-43 S to University Ave exit to the right
- Exit to your right, at the stop sign you can only go right and after turning right you will need to get in the far left lane
- Turn left at the stoplight, University Ave.
- At the second stoplight, turn right onto Humboldt Rd
- The very next right, only direction you can go, turn right on Baird Creek Rd
- Go just a short ways and turn right onto Beverly Rd, go up the hill into the Baird Creek Greenway, Triangle Hill parking lot

HIKES WITHIN AN HOUR

Pack some water, bug spray, and snacks for these great local hikes!

Barkhausen Waterfowl Preserve (10min) 1-4.8 miles loop trails popular for birding & hiking.

Fonferek Glen County Park (18min) 1.4 mile loop along creek featuring a waterfall. Perfect for warmer days.

Maribel Caves Trail (29min) 3.3 loop trail good for hiking, fishing, exploring, etc. Check website for cave tours.

Bay Beach Wildlife Sanctuary (13min) 1-4.5 miles with a few animal exhibits along the way plus good wildlife viewing.

Cofin Memorial Arboretum (15min) 1-4.8 miles of easy route with lots of wildlife.

Navarino State Wildlife Area (36min) 1-10 miles great for birding and hiking with some solitude.

Sensiba State Wildlife Area (20min) 1-3 miles of marsh trails by the Bay. Great for birding, walking, and exploring.

RAINY DAY TASKS

- Set up individual accounts at a Brown County Library for GIS
- Identify who wants to become herbicide/backpack sprayer certified, study manual, take test
- Help out at summer camps
- Clean and organize summer camp supplies, bins
- Clean shed at Triangle Hill
- Inventory items in the shed at Triangle Hill
- Create a presentation for companies that volunteer with us, contact them and ask if the next rainy day the team could come present about Baird Creek and AmeriCorps
- Learn how to work with GIS and how our GIS site works in the Baird Creek storyboard
- Filing
- Scanning and office organization
- Work on setting up locations to go and talk about AmeriCorps and the project they are working on at the Baird Creek Greenway
- Help Land Manager create land management plans for areas outside of city limits
- Hand out information brochures
- Create easement letters and mail
- Last possibility (which is highly unlikely to get to) is checking trail signage supplies and locations
